Battlefields




Forty-five Year 11 History students participated on the Battlefields of World War One Trip to Northern France and Belgium. The students had an opportunity to visit the locations of the Battle of the Somme in France by taking in the sheer size of the Lochnagar Crater and walking through the original trench dug outs at Sanctuary Wood. The students then attended the Canadian memorial at Vimy Ridge and were guided round Newfoundland Park by a Canadian University student who gave the students a tour and further education on the importance of the site during the battle and the sacrifices of the Newfoundland Regiment.

In Belgium for Remembrance Day, the students visited the numerous British Commonwealth cemeteries; Tyne Cot British Cemetery, Essex Farm Cemetery & Dressing Station. During the two minutes silence, students paid their respects at the German Lijssenthoek Military Cemetery. The trip finished with by the students observing the Last Post Ceremony at Menin Gate in Ypres. We were very proud to have three students to represent our school who laid a wreath, Olivia Armstrong, Harry Talma and William Davey.



Week of Words



On Monday 11th December we started our reading festival called the Week of Words which celebrates the love of reading and how important words are in careers in the arts today. We hosted many exciting workshops and events from authors, illustrators and journalists. Martin Walker was our first author who worked with Year 7 students, looking at his books in the Hybrid series. Paula Rawsthorne, author, joined us on Tuesday and celebrated her writing with Year 8 groups.

A very special guest joined Year 11 on Tuesday, Simon Winston, to talk about his experience as a child in the Holocaust. This was an incredibly moving and emotional event which Simon commended the students' response on, and Simon himself said he enjoyed and benefited immensely from. Jay Sandhu worked with a small group of students creating 'A Book in a Day' with poems, illustrations and stories – we look forward to this being published.

On Wednesday of the Week of Words we welcomed author Darren Simpson who led a fantastic Year 7 assembly entitled *Turning your Lemons into Lemonade* and then a Year 8 assembly looking at creating fictional villains. Julie Malone worked with our Year 7 students on Ghost Stories and then delivered a special workshop for the Carnegie Book Club.

Last Thursday we met Ian C Douglas (author) who worked with students in Years 8 and 9 on developing fantasy characters; Ben McPherson (poet) worked with Key Stage 4 and 5 Drama students and Megan Turner, BBC Journalist, worked with Year 10 Film Studies students.

We were very excited to have Nick Sharratt, the famous illustrator of Tracy Beaker and many more books, *zoom in* to share his knowledge with Year 10 GCSE Art classes; Nick is an ex-student of The Joseph Whitaker School and it was wonderful to have him share his work with current students.

Friday completed the focus week with Professor Natalie Barber (Nottingham Trent University) working on linguistics and the Nottinghamshire dialect with Year 10 and Jason Henson, crime novelist and psychologist, speaking to our Sixth Form students and running a special lunchtime club for budding crime authors.

During lunchtime on Friday we hosted a *book fair* and *book swap* through which students shared their love of reading by picking up a new book or two! Six students also received vouchers as prizes for their wonderful story boards which they had created as part of the school wide competition - well done to all of those who entered.

Lawrence Burton - Year 13

Lawrence in the desert!

In October Lawrence Burton returned from representing the England under 17s indoor cricket team at the Junior World Series in Dubai, organised by the World Indoor Cricket Federation.

This was the first Junior World Series since 2018. Each country was represented by teams at under 13s, 15s and 17s in both boys and girls. Lawrence was the only player from Notts. He was pleased to receive video messages of support from England and Notts legend Stuart Broad and current Notts and Trent Rockets star, Steven Mullaney.

As expected, the England teams faced some tough opposition from the southern hemisphere nations, where this form of cricket is hugely popular. In Lawrence's under 17 category the gold medal match was between Australia and New Zealand with the Kiwi's coming out on top. With not progressing to the final stages, England's under 17s then played in the separate Shield event where they progressed to the final and beat the host nation UAE. This meant they were invited onto the stage at the closing ceremony to collect their medals. All the games were live streamed on YouTube and with much coverage on social media it is hoped this form of the game will grow and develop in England.

Lawrence has said that it was a relentless 11 days of having to be at his peak both physically and mentally. The constant training, playing, more training, and supporting the other English teams was demanding. He said: 'The games are fast paced with the ball always in play so there is no room for lapses in concentration and all team members have to bat and bowl. I field front court leg side and have an important role in getting run outs and stopping runs being scored. I have to be very sharp in the field as I field so close to the batsman meaning I don't have much room for error. Due to my performances in the group stage games I was selected to play in the semi final and the final'. The under 17s had an experienced Aussie coach and he remarked during a stint on co-commentating duties that there was nobody better in that fielding position at the tournament.

Lawrence says it was a massive honour to wear the three lions and the ECB logo. He was able to meet players and coaches from the other major cricket playing nations and swap shirts and badges.

The Year 11 boys football team were knocked out of the English Schools Cup after a tight fought match against Ashfield School. Having beaten Ashfield in the Mansfield Cup final the last two years, they were out for revenge, and were leading 1-0 at half time. With a change in formation the second half was a different story and we dominated throughout, but ultimately were undone at set pieces and lost 3-2.

The MA-Cup 7-a-side season kicked off with the Year 7 boys event in the last week of November. After a battling performance they unfortunately didn't manage to secure a place in the finals. The Year 11 boys, out to defend their title, started with a shaky loss to Quarrydale but then went on to beat all other schools without conceding a goal and progress on to the final.

Moving into the New Year we have the boys Year 9, 11 and 6th Form teams still in with a shout in the Mansfield and District Cup. While in the County Cup the Year 7 boys are through to the quarter final and Year 8 boys to round three. We wish all teams the best of luck in the New Year.

On Wednesday 13th December the final Year 7/8 girls CVL football tournament took place on our 3G pitch. This was run as part of the FA Girls Programme to increase opportunities for competitive fixtures. A total of 14 teams have participated from schools across Newark and Sherwood, Mansfield and Ashfield districts with around 150 girls taking part. It was a great success for our students as we were 2nd in the A league and winners in the B league, with the events being supported by our fantastic Year 10 football activators.

We have had many successes in cross country this half term. In the country cross country league that take places at Berry Hill park on Saturday mornings our Year 7 boys team were crowned winners so congratulations to Wilf Oliver, Owen Cooper, Will McClemens, Euan Baxter and Harry Wright.

Within the same competition individual medals came in the form of gold for Jude Ryan (U16 boys) who finished first in all three of the races and became county league champion. Oliver McClemens also walked away with a medal as he claimed silver in the U14 boys category.
